

## “CYBERSLANG” OR THE LANGUAGE USED BY THE INTERNET USERS (A-L)

*Abstract: Our article aims at focusing on different slang expressions connected with the Internet. With the advent of the Internet, we are witnessing the development of a new type of slang, namely the “cyberslang”. This particular type of language gains ground by continually incorporating new words and expressions, from the point of view of their spelling. These words or expressions, each one more intriguing than the other, have worried the linguists who are struggling with the usage in order to maintain a literary language, as normal as possible. This is because, due to the pressure of the speakers, there have been many situations in which the usage has established the linguistic rule, regardless of different scientific situations.*

*Keywords: slang, Internet, abbreviation, syllable, number.*

The Internet is more than a range of information which one can access, just like in a library. People create their own web pages, they are sending each other e-mails, they are talking to strangers in chatrooms, keep in touch with their friends through Messenger, subscribe in mailing lists, interact in virtual worlds, etc. The main characteristic of this kind of discussions is the abbreviation accomplished through different combinations of letters, which stand for certain syllables or numbers. The domain of the English slang words used by the Internet users is bountiful, so this article comprises terms, arranged alphabetically, from A to L. The rest of the expressions, from M to Z, will be the topic of our next survey. We have tried to render a list, as comprehensible as possible, comprising a variety of slang expressions. Each expression is explained and the explanation of the abbreviated word is given between brackets. We have had as a reference book “Dicționar de argou englez-român”<sup>1</sup>. The English slang words used by the Internet users are often problematic for a lay person in the internet chatrooms. The reasons why the internauts are using this encoded language are totally understandable: time saving, communication speed, the desire to conceal the meaning of certain messages, etc. If we can run through the virtual medium of communication, we could encounter tens of words which are totally unknown for an habitual speaker. Nevertheless, this online language tends to invade our everyday life. For example, South Korea is seriously considering introducing the Internet slang as a subject of study in schools, instead of the second foreign language which the children should learn. This initiative has also attracted a lot of

criticism on the part of the linguists who believe that, on the Internet, the language seems to be changing much easier than offline.

In conclusion, we believe that “cyberslang” can jeopardize the evolution of language, since it leads to the violation of any rules of spelling and punctuation. More often than not, these words are even used by pupils in their compositions. And this is because the younger generation is the category that is most using the Internet slang. That’s why we should tell them that to communicate means not only to speak a language that is known by everyone, but also to follow the expression, spelling and punctuation rules.
