

## “CYBERSLANG” OR THE LANGUAGE USED BY THE INTERNET USERS (M – Z)

*Abstract: Our article refers to the language used especially by teenagers within the virtual environment. Nevertheless, this language is slowly making its way into our everyday lives. A significant proportion of these expressions, most of them being acronyms, has been officially acknowledged by linguists and included in various dictionaries, precisely to facilitate the comprehension of these abbreviations by amateurs in the online environment. It has practically come to the emergence of a new type of language, which is used by young people and which the adults cannot understand. This is “cyberslang”.*

*Keywords: slang, Internet, abbreviation, syllable, number.*

This survey is a follow-up to my previous article “Cyberslang” or the Language Used by the Internet Users (A-L). As the domain of the English slang words used by the Internet users is bountiful, this article comprises terms, arranged alphabetically, from M to Z. We have tried to render a list, as comprehensible as possible, comprising a variety of slang expressions. Each expression is explained and the explanation of the abbreviated word is given between brackets. We have had as a reference book “*Dicționar de argou englez-român*”<sup>1</sup>. We shouldn't be so surprised, taking into consideration the fact that the online environment is growing rapidly and that the users of this oral online means of communication are in fact the former users of written communication. Therefore, we can rightly say that this new type of language is mainly due to the new technologies.
